Step Right Up:

Formation Fun Day Returns with New Attractions

The countdown is officially on for one of the most anticipated Defence community events of the year: Formation Fun Day.

On Saturday, Sept 6 from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m., Formation Fun Day will take over the Naden Athletic Centre at Canadian Forces Base (CFB) Esquimalt. The event will unite military members, veterans, base employees, and their families for a free fair-style afternoon of food, entertainment, games, activities, and more.

This year's event promises to be a little different — in the best way.

For Leah Pokocky, Personnel Support Programs (PSP) Special Event Coordinator, creating the 2025 Formation Fun Day experience meant listening first.

"When in the initial planning stages, it was really important to me to reach out to our local Defence community to see what was enjoyed in the past, what might have been missing, and what they would be sad to not see again," she says.

As a result, the 2025 event is set to include new activities for the youngest children, along with more opportunities for older attendees to build meaningful community memories.

Families with toddlers will find plenty to love this year, with Tiny Toes Soft Play

Rentals introducing a fenced, conciergesupervised play space designed for children five and under.

As Pokocky, a mother of an active twoyear-old herself, puts it: "To find someone that safely engages your young child so you can actually finish your still-hot coffee... pure magic."

Entertainment will include That Bubble Guy's smoke-filled rainbow bubbles; Vancouver Island's largest 100-foot inflatable obstacle course; along with photo opportunities with Ponies & Pipsqueaks Pony Sanctuary. Formation Fun Day 2025 will also include stories and sing-alongs from Enchanted Fables' princess party professionals; performances by STAGES Dance and The Rising Circus; and live music by locals Mister Mojo and Stephanie Greaves.

Vendors will also add to the fun, with the community's Esquimalt Bake Shop, Saje Natural Wellness, Absolute Therapy, and more.

At its heart, Formation Fun Day is about people — it's a reminder of the strength and resilience of the Defence community. For many, the annual event has become a chance to pause from the demands of service life and reconnect with neighbors, friends, veterans, and colleagues in a relaxed setting. For newcomers recently posted to Esquimalt, Formation Fun Day

offers a doorway into the community, while for those who have been here for years, it's an opportunity to celebrate their home.

"It can be challenging to find that sense of community or belonging when you move to a new place," says Pokocky. "Formation Fun Day is about connection, whether that's reconnecting with a shipmate, meeting someone new, or discovering what's at the base and in Esquimalt."

To Sarah Taylor, a local living in Esquimalt, Formation Fun Day means even more than a chance to reconnect.

"My little one is turning two that weekend, and I'm so excited to start making memories with her at the event as she's able to experience and remember more things," she says.

Nikki Berti is also a Formation Fun Day regular, along with her 10- and 12-year-old children.

"We love all the activities, especially the bouncy trampoline," she says. "In general, it's a great day out, and the fact that it's free for the community is a big plus. We also like how we often bump into people we haven't seen in a while!"

With food, fun, and community at heart, step right up on Sept. 6 for a day of Defence community fun — on us.





I'm also of the firm belief that SH522's got one of the most beautiful views of the coast there is.

If you see me out and about, come say hello. Tell me your stories — the ones closest to your heart, the ones that matter the most. Thank you for trusting me with them.

2,300 Days at Sea

Chief Petty Officer 1st Class (CPO1) André Normand received his gold anchor years ago, a recognition from the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) for those who have spent considerable time at sea. The anchors awarded are in ascending colours: gun metal, bronze, silver and gold. The gold anchor represents more than 1,460 days at sea – four years of time.

CPO1 Normand has seen more sunsets than he can count while at sea. Not as many as his days sailed, but as many as he had time for in his 2,300 days.

Currently the Coxswain (Cox'n) of His Majesty's Canadian Ship (HMCS) *St. John's*, CPO1 Normand just achieved a massive milestone in his career and a rarity among sailors. On July 22, 2025, while deployed on Operation (Op) REASSURANCE, he spent his 2,300th day at sea – that's over six years of time.

A career that started in 1994, when he first enrolled as a Naval Combat Information Operator, almost ended after just four years.

However, his "retirement" only lasted 10 months when he decided to enroll once again.

The sea was calling his name, and he knew he couldn't leave it behind. He went on to serve aboard HMC Ships *Halifax*, *Montréal*, *Ville de Québec* and held various positions ashore in recruiting and Sea Training.

"I don't know if there is a way of explaining it. Being at sea is what I like to do. It's what I love. It makes me feel alive to be at sea," said the Cox'n when asked why he decided to return to the Navy.

It's also the crew he works with. For CPO1 Normand, one of the best parts of the job is the interactions he has with the crew, learning their background, experience, goals, ambitions and providing mentorship.

"When they are down, I bring them back up," the Cox'n affirms. "That's the aspect I like the most."

He is not entirely alone in this achievement, he admits. "There are a few, but we are a dying breed, the old guys are retiring now."

Like any member of the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF), the Cox'n credits support from family for being able to have such a long, storied career under his belt.

"What you need is the support of your family back home. Without the support of my family it would be impossible."


There will be many more sea days for CPO1 Normand. Day 2,301 will be another day doing what he loves.

Exercise Goldrush 2025 Builds Skills and **Partnerships in the Pacific Northwest**

Three Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) Orcaclass vessels (Cougar 61, Raven 56, and Grizzly 60) recently spent the past weeks engaged in Exercise Goldrush 2025 (EXGR2025), a coastal training exercise conducted amidst the scenic and challenging waterways of B.C.

The exercise united junior officers, sailors, Naval Reservists, Royal Military College (RMC) students, and Naval Experience Program participants for a dynamic, handson experience. Effectively operating together, EXGR2025 participants navigated narrow

evolutions, and honed real-world maritime skills to boost operability.

In addition to providing opportunities for participants to engage in towing drills, tidal narrows navigation, person-overboard and search and rescue exercises, Goldrush 2025 also supported the new Naval Warfare Officer Professional Qualification (NWOPQ). As a result, Junior Bridge Watchkeepers can log up to 150 hours towards the 600-hour qualification requirement, in addition to the practical experience gained in challenging waterways.

EXGR2025 was a voyage of many memorable encounters. In Ketchikan, Alaska, crews were welcomed by the United States (U.S.) Coast Guard with an invitation to the allsaw each Canadian vessel joined by two U.S. National Park Rangers who shared their knowledge of the region's history, ecology, and wildlife alongside RCN crews. Finally, a humpback whale stole the spotlight in the waters of the Pacific Northwest when it lingered alongside Cougar 61 for nearly two hours. The crew stopped both engines and followed marine wildlife safety protocols as the whale surfaced repeatedly, even rubbing itself along the hull.

The vessels also anchored in remote, picturesque locations such as Anyox, B.C., Ocean Falls, B.C., and Baranof Hot Springs, Alaska, offering sailors a rare chance to experience the natural beauty and cultural richness of the

A professional and personal milestone for many, the exercise provided RMC's Naval Cadets with their first practical sea time; Naval Reservists with opportunities to enhance operational readiness; and junior officers with scenarios to sharpen leadership and navigation.

Importantly, EXGR2025 has underscored the RCN's commitment to training, modernization, and partnership-building. Following a final August port visit in Juneau, Alaska the three vessels will travel south to Canada, returning with newfound skills, experiences, and connections.



Just off the coast of Cadboro Bay, Victoria, lies an islet jutting out of the sea — Jemmy Jones Island, an often-overlooked place carrying the legacy of one of British Columbia's most audacious mariners.

James (Jemmy) Jones (1830–1882) was a Welsh-born sea captain whose life was filled with daring West Coast escapes and shipwrecks. The island is named not in honor of a great victory, but because Jones once ran his ship aground on it. And that, as history would have it, is what stuck.

The incident was minor, with no lives lost or shipwreck — but it did leave a mark. The islet was soon dubbed Jemmy Jones Island, a name that endures on nautical charts and local maps to this day.

After spending his youth searching for his father, adventuring, and mining, Jones first made his way to the coastlines of B.C. around 1854. Here, he quickly earned a reputation as a fearless and resourceful mariner, captaining schooners through treacherous waters and running freight between Puget Sound and Victoria for over a decade.


Though illiterate, Jones also possessed a photographic memory and an uncanny sense of navigation. A striking example of this came in 1864, when Jones daringly navigated a ship through the Columbia River Bar, a stretch of water so deadly it's

known as 'the Graveyard of the Pacific.'
When the bar pilot refused to guide the ship through dangerous conditions, Jones took the helm of his schooner and made the crossing himself — from memory alone


Eventually imprisoned for debt in Victoria, Jones watched as his beloved schooner, Jenny Jones, was seized by creditors in 1865. The vessel was then taken to Olympia, Washington. Determined to reclaim his ship, he orchestrated one of the most audacious escapes in Pacific Northwest history by disguising himself as a woman and slipping out of the Victoria jail. Jones then made the 75-nauticalmile journey to Olympia, likely by canoe and small boat. After discovering that Jenny Jones was being taken to Seattle for auction by a United States marshal, Jones boarded the ship as a passenger, stealing it under cover of darkness when the marshal went ashore for the night. When eventually tried for theft, Jones was acquitted on the grounds that the marshal had abandoned the vessel.

As the court reportedly reasoned: "The marshal left the ship – the ship did not leave the marshal."





Naval Reserve supports training delivery for RMC Cadets

Over the summer, 24 naval cadets (NCdts) from the Royal Military College of Canada (RMC) have been busy taking part in the Naval Environmental Training Program for Officers (NETPO) between Kingston and the West Coast.

This year's program marked an interesting departure from tradition. For the first time in recent history, NETPO was delivered in partnership with the Naval Reserve, leveraging its expertise, facilities, and coordination efforts to provide a more flexible, modular program closer to home. As a result, portions of the course were delivered at HMCS *Cataraqui*, the local Naval Reserve Division of Kingston, Ont.

NETPO is the first step most sailors take as they embark on life at sea. The course focuses on core seamanship skills. Over the past five weeks, these NCdts received training in flood response and force protection, weapons handling, and sea survival. They handled lines, learned to identify flags and pennants, and participated in ceremonial drills. As naval officers, they also examined foundational leadership principles.

Upon completing the course, these 24 NCdts got to put their training into practice aboard an ORCA-Class training vessel. During this final phase, they worked through their qualification packages, taking on key roles on the bridge like helmsperson and lookout. They also stood duty watches and learned more from the various subject matter experts aboard about the ship's systems and how it all operates.

Reflecting on the summer's success, Lieutenant Commander (LCdr) Kevin Ng, Senior Staff Officer, Readiness and Training for the Naval Reserve's Central Region, said, "This is a proud moment for the Naval Reserve. We've shown that our reservists bring valuable capabilities to the table and can play an important role in helping the Navy meet its training goals."

These NCdts are now heading back to RMC NETPO-qualified, but the real success of this summer's training may lie in how the course was delivered — through collaboration, teamwork, and innovative approaches to training the Navy's future leaders.

What started as a father's way of helping his children through the separations of service has since turned into a family of Petty Officers, 1st Class (PO1) at the youth and Royal Canadian Navy level

Meet the Huber family, united by both blood and a shared love of the navy. Among the Hubers are three PO1s: Brendan (52), his son Patrick (15), and son Matthias (10), serving in the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN), Lanark Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps Program (RCSCC LANARK), and the Carlplace Navy League Cadet Corps Program (NLCC Carlplace) respectively. When asked if his children might consider pursuing military careers, PO1 Huber shared that Patrick has already applied to a co-op program with the 33 Canadian Brigade Group. Matthias is still unsure of what he'd like to pursue

"I will say he [Matthias] has given me a good shoulder shrug in the past while saying 'Maybe,' regarding the CAF," PO1 Huber shares. "I will say Patrick seems to look forward to outranking me, and Matthias sure would love to boss me around a bit."

Importantly, sharing a naval link with his sons has brought the Hubers even closer, with the family looking forward to participating in Defence Community events next year as 'the PO1s.'

When home with his children, PO1 Huber often spends time teaching seamanship with the Navy League and Sea Cadets. "I'll teach knots and other rope work. I show the kids how to use the bos'n call. I also talk about my times at sea, what we do on trips, and how life is onboard."
