Here I am again: sitting behind a keyboard with a blank page on my screen. It always feels good to be here — at the beginning of something new. My career has taken me from local reporting to writing for global brands, and now I'm back in community news. Because I believe storytelling matters, it feels like the right time to introduce myself and tell a chapter of my story.

I'm Lindsay Groves, the Corporate Services Manager for the Lookout Newspaper, part of the Personnel Support Programs (PSP) team. I joined the team in July 2025.

My brother, Sub-Lieutenant (SLt) Nicholas (Nick) Groves, enlisted in the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) in 2012. He was proud and ready. As a family, we celebrated his professional milestones throughout the years of service with memories of his graduation at His Majesty's Canadian Ship (HMCS) Venture. We also celebrated his life with a ceremony at Venture as Nick proudly served on HMCS Ottawa until his death in 2017 after his battle with cancer.

There is a saying on the wall at Work Point's Nixon Gym that reads, "A new undertaking to dare & not be afraid." While I did not witness my brother in his naval environment, I knew him, and I was with him from his diagnosis to his death. To witness his strength, courage, and humour in the face of this impossible challenge remains a guiding light in my life.

During his battle, Nick experienced an outpouring of care and support from this base. I can confirm that his experience, along with my family's experience in caring for him, would have been extremely different with additional layers of difficulty if it were not for the morale, benefits, and support offered by this community. He would often tell me how grateful he was to be a part of this

world. (His in memoriam announcement is featured in the *Lookout's* Volume 62 Number 6.)

For me, joining the *Lookout* team is not about stepping into the past. It's about carrying forward the values I saw in my brother and in this community: courage, connection, and resilience. Lieutenant Commander (LCdr) Jenna Lawson (previously our Family Liaison Officer) emailed me on my first workday with a note, "Oh the JOY of seeing a Groves in the address book again." It feels good to be here.

I look forward to the journey ahead, to dare and not be afraid on this next adventure. I want to thank the incredible Lookout team and PSP team for the warm welcome. I look forward to bringing more stories that celebrate and strengthen the Defence community. And thank you, reader, for being here.

Returns to CFB Esquimalt

The Raven Program is one of five Indigenous summer programs offered annually by the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF). A six-week summer Basic Military Qualification (BMQ) course designed specifically for Indigenous participants from across Canada, Raven blends Indigenous cultural teachings with naval-focused military training.

The 2025 iteration of the Raven Indigenous Summer Program included a Confidence Course. Held at Camp Albert Head, Canadian Forces Base (CFB) Esquimalt on July 31, the outdoor course challenged program participants to successfully scale walls, navigate rope bridges, complete net climbs, and more.

Notably, Raven is not designated as a youth program — rather, it is open to Indigenous people of all ages eligible to join the CAF (16-57). This year, Raven saw participants learning and connecting with traditional Indigenous values and teachings; learning defence skills during the BMQ course; and spending a day aboard a Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) vessel to boost military knowledge and experience life at sea. Students were also taught weapons handling, navigation, first-aid, flood containment, firefighting, and more.

To Master Sailor (MS) Henry McDavid, Naval Combat Information Operator and Raven instructor, the program also provides participants with a wealth of valuable insights beyond military skills.

"Everyone has that little voice in the back of their head filled with fears of 'what if," said McDavid. "But you will learn on this course that your fear of failure is stopping you before you even begin, and that you are capable of more than you ever thought you would be."

Just days after the Confidence Course, on Aug 6, the group travelled to the Nanaimo Range for a live-fire range day. The Raven Program officially concluded on Aug 18 following a formal graduation ceremony held at CFB Esquimalt.

Reflecting on the 2025 iteration of the course, MS McDavid shared, "I am confident that each of the graduates walked away with a sense of accomplishment, confidence, and a deeper understanding of the nuances of teamwork and leadership. Even more importantly, they walked away with knowledge on how that can apply those skills not just to the military, but also everyday life."

Over the years, Raven has become a cornerstone of the CAF's Indigenous programs by offering people from First Nations, Inuit, and Métis communities a unique introduction to military life while honouring their cultural identities. As such, the graduation ceremony also included the receipt of sashes for Métis program graduates from members of the Métis Nation, songs sung by Indigenous community members, and the presence of an Indigenous carving standing watch over the ceremony.

Following graduation, Raven also provides program graduates with high school credit and the opportunity for a future career with the CAF. As participants return home, the Raven program remains a testament to the strength that blooms when tradition and service walk side by side.

To Master Sailor (MS) Carmen Pham, Material Management Technician and Raven instructor, the program's significance lasts well beyond graduation.

"The true impact of Raven is clear when previous candidates reach back out. Sometimes for operational support, career guidance, or even help navigating civilian life," she said. "These are the connections that prove Raven is more than a course. Rather, it's a network of lasting change."

Remembrance in Victoria, Honour in Halifax: RCN Accepts HMCS Robert Hampton Gray

On Aug 21, the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) officially accepted His Majesty's Canadian Ship (HMCS) Robert Hampton

The vessel is the sixth and final in a new fleet of Harry DeWolf-class Arctic and Offshore Patrol Vessel (AOPV). Built under the National Shipbuilding Strategy, Robert Hampton Gray will safeguard Canadian waters, strengthen Arctic sovereignty, and deploy abroad. Notably, the AOPV is capable of operating in first-year ice of 120-centimetre thickness, allowing the RCN unescorted access to previously inaccessible areas of the Arctic.

However, Robert Hampton Gray's acceptance carries weight far beyond steel and ceremony its name is an act of remembrance for Lieutenant (Lt) Robert Hampton Gray, the last Canadian to be awarded the Victoria

On Aug 9, 1945, Lt Gray climbed into the cockpit of his Corsair fighter from the aircraft carrier His Majesty's Ship Formidable, leading an attack on Japanese ships in Onagawa Bay. Despite flying straight into concentrated anti-aircraft fire and taking a hit, he continued with his attack by releasing a bomb on the destroyer Amakusa while flying very low to ensure a successful hit. Struck by his bomb, the vessel capsized and sank. Lt Gray's

flaming aircraft then crashed into the sea.

Only 27 years old when he passed, Lt Gray's body was never recovered.

Exactly 80 years after his passing, on Aug 9, 2025, HMCS Robert Hampton Gray was named in an East Coast ceremony at Halifax Shipyard, Nova Scotia. At the same time, Canadians also gathered on the West Coast to honour Lt Gray in a Vancouver Island remembrance ceremony at the British Columbia (B.C.) Aviation Museum. Here, representatives of the RCN and the Royal Canadian Airforce (RCAF), members of the Vancouver Island Branch of the Naval Association of Canada, and museum supporters all gathered to remember the navy pilot.

Lt Gray was also honored on Aug 9 in Japan at a memorial raised in Onagawa the only monument dedicated to a foreign service member on Japanese soil.

With Canada's Harry DeWolf-class vessels being the first in RCN history to all be named after Canadian war heroes, it is fitting that the final vessel of the fleet bears the name Robert Hampton Gray. The vessel's commissioning ceremony will take place in 2026 after its arrival to Canadian Forces Base (CFB) Esquimalt, after which it will officially join the Pacific Fleet.

Importantly, Robert Hampton Gray reminds us that our navy's strength rests not only in its ships, but in the courage and commitment of those who serve aboard them.

Prime Minister Visits CFMETR Nanoose Bay

On Aug 4, Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney visited The Canadian Forces Maritime Experimental and Test Ranges (CFMETR) at Nanoose Bay, Victoria, British Columbia (B.C.).

The prime minister was also joined by Vice-Admiral (VAdm) Angus Topshee, Commander of the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN), and Commander (Cdr) Craig Piccolo, Commanding Officer of the Nanoose Bay facility.

During the visit, the prime minister, VAdm Topshee, and Cdr Piccolo toured several King's Harbour Master vessels and range facilities that play critical roles in underwater acoustic

testing and maritime defence research. The prime minister also visited the Range Operation

Centre, where advanced monitoring and naval systems testing are conducted.

According to a statement from the office of the Prime Minister, the visit was intended to underscore Canada's strategic plan to rebuild, rearm, and reinvent

the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF). The statement also noted that the prime minister utilized the visit to personally thank members of the RCN for their service and dedication to our

The visit concluded with the prime minister meeting CFMETR personnel and their families, a moment that was both memorable and meaningful to those involved.



Rainbow Park:

A Quiet Link to Canada's Naval Past

Tucked away in a quiet residential corner along Victoria's Songhees walkway, Rainbow Park is a peaceful green space long enjoyed by islanders.

However, few who pass through realize that the park likely carries the name of His Majesty's Canadian Ship (HMCS) Rainbow, a Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) vessel that once played a pivotal role in Canada's maritime history.

The ship was built in 1892 as His Majesty's Ship Rainbow, an Apolloclass protected cruiser for the British Royal Navy which eventually arrived at Esquimalt Harbor in November 1910, following a transfer to the RCN. Serving as a training vessel on Canada's West Coast, Rainbow conducted fishery patrols and was utilized for ceremonial purposes.

During the First World War, HMCS Rainbow played a valuable role in the Pacific, where the vessel was dispatched to cover the withdrawal of His Majesty's Ship (HMS) Shearwater and HMS Algerine, vessels that had been protecting British citizens during civil unrest in Mexico.

In July 1914, HMCS Rainbow was ordered to escort the Komagata Maru, a Japanese merchant ship with Sikh immigrants from India, from Vancouver back to India.

The ship's passengers had not been permitted to disembark for over two months from the Vancouver harbour because of Canada's immigration laws that prevented immigration from South Asia. Upon Komagata Maru's return to India, 20 passengers were killed, underscoring the consequence of their denied refuge in Canada.

At the edge of Victoria's Rainbow Park stands a weathered stone cairn, largely overlooked by passersby. Embedded in its surface is the imprint of a ship's crest — its details worn by time, but its presence unmistakable. Longtime residents and naval enthusiasts both believe this may once have been the crest of HMCS Rainbow, a tribute to the ship for which the park is named.

Though no plaque or crest remains, the cairn is thought to serve as a quiet reminder of Victoria's deep naval roots, a symbol of how history sometimes endures in subtlest of ways.

Rainbow Park offers more than a green space to enjoy. Rather, it provides visitors with a quiet invitation: to pause, wonder, and most importantly, remember.



"We've listened to our occupants and




recognized the shift in how they want to access housing services. More than half of our occupants are eager to manage their housing needs digitally, from updating contact details to submitting service requests."

CFMETR and DFO Collaborate to Rescue Whale in Distress

Quick action and strong coordination between the Canadian Forces Maritime Experimental and Test Ranges (CFMETR) and the Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) recently led to the successful rescue of a distressed humpback whale in the Strait of Georgia.

At approximately 10:15 a.m. on Aug 27, Mickael El-Hachem, a King's Harbour Master (KHM) crew member aboard the Canadian Forces Auxiliary Vessel (CFAV) *Stikine*, spotted what appeared to be a buoy moving unnaturally in water two nautical miles away.

Upon closer inspection, by 10:30 a.m. the crew identified it to be a humpback whale entangled in a buoy and line system in the northeast portion of Area Whiskey Golf.

The whale appeared to be in distress, prompting Captain Bill Lawrenuk, Commanding Officer of CFAV *Stikine* to immediately notify Lieutenant(Navy) Donald MacDonald, Range Officer, and Melina Sorensen, Environmental Officer.

Sorensen then contacted the DFO, which dispatched Paul Cottrell, Marine Mammal Coordinator, and two fisheries officers to the scene. Cottrell noted that efforts to locate and free the whale had been underway for several days.

Supported by orders from Commander Craig Piccolo, CFMETR Commanding Officer, all operations were placed on standby to prioritize the whale's rescue. As such, *Stikine* remained at the scene, continuing to monitor the animal's speed, direction, and behaviour from a safe distance.

DFO arrived at 12:45 p.m. and, following a brief assessment, carefully devised a collaborative disentanglement plan with *Stikine*. Upon DFO's request, CFMETR's security vessel *Ranger 3* was tasked to provide rescue support as needed.

By 4 p.m., DFO reported that the buoy and lines had been successfully disentangled from the whale, which was in stable condition.

In addition to exhibiting the coordination and readiness of CFMETR and DFO personnel, the successful whale rescue highlighted the importance of ongoing environmental stewardship.


