

RCN Decommissions HMC Ships Brandon, Whitehorse, and Saskatoon

After decades of carrying sailors through storm, sea, and service, three Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) vessels are His Majesty's Canadian (HMC) Ships no more.

On Monday, Sept 29, the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) formally paid off His Majesty's Canadian Saskatoon, Ships (HMCS) Whitehorse, and Brandon in a ceremony at Canadian Forces Base (CFB) Esquimalt. Hundreds of serving and former sailors, families, and Defence community members gathered at CFB Esquimalt's Bravo 'B' Jetty to honour the vessels

and the thousands of Canadians who served in them. The ceremony was presided over by Vice-Admiral (VAdm) Angus Topshee, Commander of the RCN.

"The weather today reflects much of what a paying off ceremony is — bittersweet in nature," said VAdm Topshee. "But there is light, and we wait for it to show itself through the clouds." Named after the Canadian cities of Whitehorse in Yukon, Saskatoon in Saskatchewan, and Brandon in Manitoba, the ships are part of a fleet of 12 Kingston-class Maritime Coastal Defence Vessels (MCDVs) commissioned into the RCN in the late 1990s. All Kingston-class vessels are scheduled to be retired by 2028

as part of the RCN's modernization plan to shift resources toward the future fleet.

Now, Brandon, Whitehorse, and Saskatoon have been formally decommissioned at the very place they once joined Canada's naval fleet — their home, Esquimalt, British Columbia (B.C.).

The ceremony was both a proud and emotional moment for the RCN. While it signified the end of active service, it also preserved the legacy of the vessel's name, crest, and countless sailors whose careers were shaped aboard.


The ceremony centered around the traditional lowering of the vessels' naval jack, ensign, and commissioning pennants, as well as

the final departure of the ships' company. The event also included formal addresses by VAdm Angus Topshee, Commander of the RCN, Captain(Navy) Samuel Patchell, Commander of Canadian Fleet Pacific, Commodore (Cmdre) Patrick Montgomery, and the Formation Chaplain. A traditional Naval Prayer was also recited by ceremony attendees and participants in a united moment of pride and remembrance.

For many sailors, the farewell was personal. Brandon, Whitehorse, and Saskatoon were more than steel hulls and engines; they were workplaces, classrooms, and homes. As time moves forward, their decommissioning also reflects the Navy's continued modernization and transition to meet Canada's future maritime needs.

"These ships have contributed important mine countermeasure roles on international operations and have regularly participated in exercises with partner navies abroad," said VAdm Topshee. "As we move towards the future of the RCN, I want to recognize the service of these ships and extend my tremendous gratitude to all who have sailed within them."

Though Brandon, Whitehorse, and Saskatoon's final chapters at sea are now written, their histories will forever remain woven into the broader fabric of our navy.

Fleet Diving Unit (Pacific)

After 13 months of training above and beneath ocean waves, 12 new clearance divers are surfacing with pride.

On Oct 10 at Fleet Diving Unit (Pacific) (FDU(P)), students from the 2025 Clearance Diver Rank Qualification Sailor First Class (RQS1) course will officially graduate. These graduates are set to receive official clearance diver dolphin pins as a symbol of their accomplishment.

Among the graduating class is Sailor Third Class (S3) Thomas Fournier, who joined the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) through the 2023 Naval Experience Program (NEP). S3 Fournier, originally from Muskoka, Ontario, then challenged the Clearance Diver Assessment Centre (CDAC) in Feb 2024. The CDAC manages the screening, evaluation, and selection for those looking to join the Clearance Diver RQS1 course.

"My experience on the clearance diver course was the best year of my life. I had an amazing time. There were lots of opportunities for selfdevelopment, professional-development, and team cohesion," said S3 Fournier. "Everyone I worked with was very helpful and supportive of working through challenges. Overall, my experience was very positive. I have developed as a person in many, many ways, and I am ready to add to wherever I go as a clearance diver."

Clearance divers are the Canadian Armed Forces' (CAF) deep-sea mine disposal specialists. As such, they dive with various equipment including the Compressed Air Breathing Apparatus (CABA), the Rebreather, and the Surface Supplied Breathing Apparatus (SSBA) to carry out duties. Clearance divers also operate recompression chambers to support diving operations and support Health Services with recompression treatments and submarine search and rescue (SUBSAR). Additional duties include maintaining diving equipment for all CAF diving teams, including Search and Rescue technicians and combat divers.

Following graduation, some graduates are set

to begin their careers at the School of Diving, where aspiring CAF divers are trained. Other graduates plan to provide underwater repairs and maintenance support to His Majesty's Canadian (HMC) ships and participate in salvage and mine countermeasure operations.

Notably, clearance divers are also trained for advanced conventional munitions disposal to meet the CAFs' domestic explosive ordnance disposal mandate. This often requires divers (frequently those with the rank of Sailor First Class) to deploy across B.C. to recover military ordnance and, when necessary, safely dispose of it using explosives.

S3 Fournier is prepared to deploy on various operations and exercises. These may include mine countermeasures executed on Operation (Op) REASSURANCE in the Baltic or Black Sea, the disposal of historical Second World War ordnances on Pacific islands during Op RENDER SAFE, or working alongside Canada's Indo-Pacific allies on Op HOŘIZON.

"We're always looking for fit, smart, and motivated people to become Clearance Divers," said Lt(Navy) Michael Cormie of FDU(P). "We're in a period of reconstitution, where we are focused on increasing the amount of clearance divers available to support CAF operations. I encourage people to apply for what's arguably one of the best jobs in the


Voluntary Occupation Transfer to the role of a clearance diver is open to all non-commissioned member (NCM) trades, with or without previous diving qualifications and experience. Changes are also being introduced for officers seeking to become Clearance Diving Officers (CLDO), with all officers (regular or reserve) now able to challenge the CDAC to become a CLDO, regardless of trade.

For those interested in challenging the

- Deadline to submit a Component Transfer package is Oct 31 for Reservists.

Updates to **MARPAC Dress** and Deportment **Policy**

Information from the Base Standing Orders

As Maritime Forces Pacific (MARPAC) continues to sharpen its operational focus, how the Defence team presents itself must reflect the reality of who we are: a fighting force.

The uniform is more than fabric; it's a visible commitment to discipline, readiness, and unity. Operational Dress reinforces the mindset that every member is part of something larger, and that shared identity directly contributes to mission effectiveness, cohesion, and public confidence in the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF).

Effective October 1, 2025, the Base Standing Orders (BSO) 5250-0 Dress and Deportment Policy will be updated. The dress of the day will be Operational Dress across MARPAC. Exceptions may apply depending on the nature of scheduled meetings or events. Unit supervisors are expected to conduct monthly dress inspections, rotating orders of dress to ensure all uniforms are worn correctly and meet standards.

This change also affects Dress with a Difference (DWAD), which will now occur on the second Friday of each month at an increased cost of \$3 per DWAD day. The new standard of civilian attire will be modified Smart Casual — no longer allowing t-shirts, and favouring collared shirts, blouses, dress pants, slacks or clean jeans,

etc. Details on acceptable items are defined in the updated BSO 5250-0. This may impact National Defence Workplace Charity Campaign (NDWCC) fundraising, but the efforts from NDWCC volunteers will continue to help achieve collective goals.

Canadian Rangers Train with NORFORCE in Australia

From July 8-28, the 4th Canadian Ranger Patrol Group (4CRPG) and Australia's North-West Mobile Force (NORFORCE) conducted Exercise SOUTHERN CROSS 2025 (Ex SC25) in Australia.

This Small Unit Exchange (SUE), which began in 2011, alternates bi-annually between the two allied units. Since its founding, the exchange has offered opportunities for participants to enhance interoperability and camaraderie while also introducing them to unique traditions and cultures. This year, NORFORCE hosted three staff members and 12 Canadian Rangers from 4CRPG.

The exercise began in Darwin, Northern Territory, at NORFORCE's Darwin Squadron Headquarters. Here, Canadian Rangers received various forms of training to prepare for the Australian wilderness and learn skills essential to NORFORCE's operations. Rangers trained with the F89 Minimi and HK416 assault rifles and engaged in water safety training that included 100-meter uniformed swims, treading water exercises, and capsized vessel drills. Wildlife safety briefings also covered hazards such as crocodiles and jellyfish.

The group then moved to Shoal Bay for survival training, which included friction fire lighting, night navigation using the Southern Cross constellation, and plant identification.

Following the Darwin phase, the group flew to Broome, Western Australia, to train at Kimberley Squadron's Forward Operating Base, Robert Knox. Canadian Rangers were divided into two smaller groups for concurrent training. One group conducted amphibious operations at Ngamakoon in King Sound and Cone Bay, while the other trained at Neem Campground and Beagle Bay. Activities included shoreline surveillance and covert observation posts via capsized vessel and Regional Patrol Vessel, as well as medicinal plant identification. Rangers also engaged with mud crabbing, an activity guided by a Yaburara Elder who shared the history of the Beagle Bay Mission. Kimberley Squadron also delivered specialized coastal training.

Throughout Ex SC25, Canadian Rangers and staff explored the similarities and differences between 4CRPG and NORFORCE. While both units face common challen-

ges operating in remote areas within their respective Areas of Responsibility (AOR), their techniques and procedures differ, with NORFORCE's covert border security tactics contrasting with

4CRPG's domestic assistance focus. Additionally, NORFORCE provides equipment, whereas Canadian Rangers rely on personal gear.

Despite these differences, both units depend heavily on local community input and support.

To Major (Maj) Jonathan Spiess, Officer Commanding of 4CRPG's "B" Company, NORFORCE's reliance on local communities mirrors 4CRPG's approach.

"Isolated communities in our AORs should be considered key terrain in mission analysis," said Maj

Another key value of Ex SC25 was the opportunity to gain irreplicable insights based on variables like environmental factors, which require firsthand experience to truly understand and adapt to.

As Master Corporal (MCpl) Joline Couture noted, NORFORCE's Australian environment posed challenges for those unaccustomed to water. Engagements with specific local communities also provided unique learning experiences, with 4CRPG personnel able to connect with Indigenous communities on the Dampier Peninsula and learn their traditions while strengthening

Although this SUE has existed for over a decade, it continues to evolve, with Ex SC25 uniquely operational in nature. Ex SC25 also facilitated tactic sharing and fresh insights on remote operations.

Following the exercise, par-

ticipants noted it as an undoubted highlight of their career. Next year, the SUE will return to Canada with Exercise NOTHERN LIGHTS, once more strengthening the Canada-Australia alliance.

Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home

National Fire Prevention Association's Fire Prevention Week is Here: CHARGE INTO FIRE SAFETY

Every October, Fire Prevention Week reminds Canadians of the importance of protecting themselves and their communities from fire.

Sponsored and hosted by the National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA) since 1922, Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of Oct 9 in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, which began on Oct 8, 1871, and caused devastating damage to over 100,000 people and their communities.

Under the theme 'Charge into Fire Safety: Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home', this year's annual campaign runs from Oct 5-11. Lithium-ion batteries power many of the devices we use, but they can also pose fire risks if handled improperly. As such, the NFPA stresses three steps:

- Buy safely: Look for certification marks such as UL, ETL, or CSA when purchasing products that use lithium-ion batteries.
- Charge safely: Always use the cords that come with a product, follow manufacturer instructions, and charge on a hard surface. Avoid overcharging, and unplug devices once fully charged.

Recycle safely: Never throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins. Visit call2recycle.org to find a safe drop-off location.

For Mike McLean, Chief Fire Prevention Officer at Canadian Forces Base (CFB) Esquimalt, fire safety education is vital.

"To me, there is nothing more important than keeping your family and friends safe, and that includes fire safety," said McLean. "I care about the people I work with, where I work, and my country, so it's essential we continue to educate ourselves about fire safety to protect each other."

Practicing good charging habits affects not only ourselves, but the communities we are a part of.

"If we are not using good charging habits, things like overheating batteries, not using charger that came with your device, using unlisted (not Canadian Safety Approved) products, we risk a potential fire," said McLean. "Not only might you put yourself in harm's way, but your friends and family might also unfortunately be put in a position of injury and/or death."

Fire safety saves lives: practice careful charging habits.

CAF Food Menu Revitalization: Serving Up

After thoroughly reviewing Food Service Standards across Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) kitchens, changes are cooking for Department of National Defence (DND) diners.

National direction has been given for galleys to localize offerings in 2026, with a menu standardization approach that has been simmering for the past decade.

CFB Esquimalt galleys are taking a staggered approach to implementing these adjustments, with several already served up. The most noticeable change thus far lies in the salad bar, which has shifted towards a 'Build-a-Salad/Bowl' concept. There will be continued reduction in prepared salad offerings alongside an increase in cooked grains, cheese, and plant-based protein options. These additions are designed to give diners flexibility while still meeting mandated nutritional standards.

Sandwich bar offerings have also been beefed up to allow diners with more choice. Kitchen Managers have also cooked up a rotating menu selection to lower stress when choosing between the daily sandwich, wrap, and hot offering - no need to scramble at the last minute after discovering the day's options. Diners will also begin to find more plant-based meat, cheese, and sauce alternatives throughout the day.

As CFB Esquimalt Food Services moves towards full implementation in January 2026, feedback is welcomed from DND-funded diners on past and upcoming changes. If you have meal ideas you'd love to see in your galley, inform your food services team so we can help it make the cut and land on your plate.

To do this, the CET&P examines the physical environment, governance, and subjective unit member experiences of health and wellness across MARPAC units through five key health and wellness categories: Active Living and Injury Prevention, Addictions-Free Living, Healthy Nutrition, Mental and Social Wellness, and Organizational Wellness.

Utilization of the CET&P includes a physical walkthrough of the participating unit, an assessment of its policies around the five priority categories, and individual questionnaires intended to incorporate a qualitative element to the data. Results then identify both strengths and challenges within the participating unit, therefore guiding targeted actions intended to boost health and wellness.

"On a broader scale, the CET&P also promotes shared responsibility for health and wellness by highlighting opportunities to improve environments, policies, and leadership approaches to better support members," said Vicy Doucette, Health Promotion Specialist. "Health and wellness will no longer be seen solely as an individual responsibility, but also as an organizational outcome.

The benefits of a tool like MHWS's CET&P are clear. According to the most recent Health and Lifestyle Information Survey, roughly 20 per cent of Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) members were

unable to deploy due to healthrelated barriers. When one in five CAF members cannot deploy,

valuable pulse check for leaders. "Participating in the pilot focused my attention on

morale and welfare," he said. "It gave me a sense of how well the unit is functioning with regards to the mental and physical wellbeing of its members. This is where meaningful change can happen."

For leaders, the process is intentionally low disruption.

"The surveys and interviews were minimally invasive, and did not disrupt my unit at all," said Capt(Navy) Kooiman. "Beyond a short questionnaire and some minimal investment of time, there is no downside. I would encourage all commanding officers to participate."

Looking ahead, both Doucette and Capt(Navy) Kooiman see the CET&P as a way to shape the long-term culture of MARPAC



RCN Prepares Moorings for Arrival of New HMCS Protecteur

From Sept 22-26, the King's Harbour Master (KHM) led a vital mooring trip to Nanoose Bay to conduct vital repairs, maintenance, and upgrades to Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) mooring buoys.

These buoys are essential for naval operations at the Canadian Forces Maritime Experimental and Test Ranges (CFMETR). Additionally, one of the buoys will be upgraded to support the RCN's soon-to-arrive Auxiliary Oiler Replenishment (AOR) ship, the new *HMCS Protecteur*.

The journey also marked the final mooring trip of the tug *Glendale*, which has supported mooring trips for nearly 50 years since entering service in 1975. *Glendale* was also joined by the *Lawrenceville* tug and the YDG 250, a 50-ton floating steampowered crane barge.



To Mooring Officer Brian Whittaker, one of the most challenging moments of the mooring trip is the task of finding the pick-up chain.

"The first step is to find and drag a hook (attached to a 1.5inch chain that is 200ft long.) There is a pick-up chain along the bottom that we need to correctly snag to bring the anchor to the surface. Once we have both anchors on deck (2 separate mooring legs), then we can start to lift the gear on the deck of the crane barge."

Finally, there is a moment of fulfillment for involved personnel when all gear has been inspected, repaired, and replaced as necessary. To complete the process, all mooring chains are carefully returned back into the water, not to be seen for years.



KHM personnel, along with Fleet Maintenance Facility (FMF) members from Canadian Forces Base (CFB) Esquimalt, ensured the safe and successful completion of the week-long mission.
